Each and every one of these graduates embodies Maharat's groundbreaking and sacred goal: empowering Orthodox women to realize their dreams of leading the Jewish people, thereby modeling the power and necessity of Orthodox female leadership.

Our graduates serve and raise up Jewish communities throughout the world, in ten countries across five continents. In our 16th year with 100 graduates in the field, we will raise our graduates to new heights of leadership, while continuing to invest in what we do best: educating the next

generation of Orthodox rabbis to be Torahcentric leaders who are grounded in Jewish law and sensitive and compassionate to the needs of today's Jewish community.

Over the next three years, we will recruit Maharat's next 100 rabbinic leaders, invest in and innovate our curriculum to ensure it will be maximally relevant for today's Jewish community, and create a formal network of resources and community for our alumnae, many of whom are the first Orthodox women in their roles.

aharat was founded on the belief that Orthodox female leaders are critical for the future of the Jewish community. Ordination and the authority of a title are necessary for women to make a profound impact. We focus on learning and scholarship for a purpose: excellence in Torah, halakha, and tradition, overlaid with pastoral and leadership training, enable Maharat leaders to take the Jewish community to new heights.

We train rabbis who are compassionate leaders, listeners, scholars, and educators. Learning, teaching, upholding, and doing informs our foundational and fundamental vision. Our vision also includes upholding our tradition out in the world, while boldly bringing about the changes that raise up the Jewish community. We actively bring more joy and justice to the world.

We are a force and leader in the global Jewish community, ordaining rabbis who transcend boundaries, build denominational, communal, and interfaith bridges, and have ignited a revolution in visionary, learned, and relatable leadership.


## Theory of Change

## **Meeting the Need**

Maharat is unique in explicitly granting semikha to women, and after 16 years of experience in the field, we have learned specifically what women need before, during, and after their time in rabbinical school in order to make the biggest impact on the Jewish community.



- Engage high school and college students in Maharat programming and develop continuing touchpoints
- Develop relationships with Orthodox camps and day schools
- Create a pipeline for second career candidates



- Pilot career-based fellowships to strengthen connections between students and placements
- Engage lay leaders by providing certification for pastoral training
- Launch Hear Her Voice: Center for Writing, Homiletics, and Communications Training



- Launch Revava: Alumnae and Torah Leader Network
- Support placements and professional development throughout rabbinic careers
- Increase formal relationships with Orthodox institutions
- Create programs for post-semikha learning and continuing education

## **ENROLLMENT**

#### **Build the pipeline of Maharat candidates**

Maharat will continue attracting highly qualified students and increase the market of candidates. By elevating Talmud learning for high school and college women, we will cultivate and build relationships with candidates. In addition, we will create new strategies for appealing to women seeking out second careers.

## **RIGOR**

Ensure continued high-quality education that serves as a differentiator for Maharat

Over the past 16 years, both the rabbinate and the needs of the Jewish community have evolved, as has the diversity of the student body. Our programs uphold high standards of learning and rigor, making this an opportune time to reassess the curriculum, processes, and expectations to ensure they continue to support those standards.

#### **STRATEGIES**

- Conduct core curriculum audit across programs
- Ensure effective and equitable learning environments for all students globally to underscore highest quality across all mediums, modalities, and locations
- Launch Hear Her Voice: Center for Writing, Homiletics, and Communications Training for Female Rabbis and Rabbinical Students

## INNOVATION

#### Develop new programs for maximum impact

Maharat will strengthen career-based skills for current students—chaplaincy, education, entrepreneurship, and pulpit work—through fellowships that enhance program rigor and align graduates with field needs. We will also extend our pastoral education philosophy to the broader community by offering training to non-rabbinic professionals.

## Psychological First Aid: Rabbinic Care in Times of Trauma

## Establish a thriving network of female Orthodox leaders

Maharat is committed to ensuring our graduates thrive as leaders in the Jewish community by advancing the role of Orthodox female rabbis. This includes building new organizational relationships, equipping graduates with essential career skills, and offering ongoing support to increase their acceptance and visibility.

#### **STRATEGIES**

- Launch Revava: Alumnae and Torah Leader Network
- Build Career Lab to strengthen career opportunities for graduating students and alumnae
- Connect female leaders to key Orthodox communal institutions

#### **HIGHLIGHT**

## Maharat Compensation Study

In order to resource and elevate alumnae and women in similar spiritual and Torah leader positions, Maharat launched a survey examining rabbinic salaries in the Orthodox community. This effort will contribute to salary transparency and equity for Orthodox women rabbis and will actively address disparities in wage gaps.









## **Opportunities & Outcomes**

In this new landscape, Maharat's strategy will differentiate us in this current reality. At the end of 2028, evidence of Maharat's success will include raising up (na'aleh):

- the number of middle, high school, and college students engaged in Maharat programming
- recruitment and opportunities in Israel and globally
- the rigor of ordination to encapsulate both rabbanut standards and the full breadth of Maharat's education
- women's writing and speaking abilities
- merit-based fellowships leading graduates to impactful rabbinic careers




- placements of graduates in vibrant, established, dynamic Orthodox communities, Jewish day schools, and education positions
- relationships and programs with lay leaders and communities
- graduates and other similarly qualified women participating in a thriving alumnae network
- the number of women in senior rabbinic positions
- the recognition of Maharat as a sought-after resource for post-semikha deeper learning



## Over the next three years,

Maharat's budget will grow cumulatively by 20% to address its strategic goals and priorities. Maharat will make investments in staff, marketing and communications, alumnae support, and fellowship stipends to align with these priorities.
