

## Seventh Annual Semikha Ceremony June 17, 2019 Rabbi Jeffrey Fox, Rosh HaYeshiva

One hundred years ago on May 21st, 1919 the proposed amendment passed the House and on June 4th, just three weeks later, the Senate voted in support. Several months later, in August of 1920, the Tennessee legislature ratified the 19th amendment prohibiting the states and federal government from denying the right to vote based on sex.

The Tennessee legislature was deadlocked 48 to 48 and Harry Burn walked in with his red rose signifying his opposition. However, as they were calling the vote he discovered a note from his mom, Phoebe Ensminger Burn, tucked inside his jacket pocket. In it she prodded him to, "be a good boy and vote for ratification." It was his vote that tipped the legislature and ultimately passed the 19th amendment.

How does change happen? Sometimes we rabbis like to imagine that change comes from an important *teshuva* or *psak* or article or some grand gesture. However, most of the time, change happens not <u>only</u> from the Susan B. Anthonys of the world but with the help of a private letter from a mother tucked inside the jacket of her son.

The Gemara (Berachot 40a, Sukkah 46b) actually tells us the secret of how to move the community forward ever so gently. Playing with the first phrase of the second paragraph of the Shema, והיה אם שמוע (Devarim 11:13) and picking up on the double language of שמוע תשמעו, typically translated as "if you will carefully listen" the rabbis say:

אם שמוע בישן If you listen carefully to the old תשמע בחדש you will come to understand the new.

Allow me to interpret this phrase a bit creatively:

אם שמוע בישן If you listen carefully to the tradition, to our *mesorah* תשמע בחדש You will come to understand anew, and perhaps even create anew

Tonight we celebrate eight amazing individuals who bring quiet change through their ability to listen to the tradition and hear voices that were not so prominent in the past.

**Rebecca Blady** - Blady, your *neshama* brings people together and grounds the Torah of your family by connecting you both horizontally to those in the room and vertically to the presence of God. Simply by setting up shop in Berlin, without making any radical public declarations, you subtly change the rabbinic landscape for a community that is spiritually hungry. I have no doubt that your zaidy is smiling down on the amazing work that you, Jeremy and Hindy have already begun.
